WHY DOES MY CHILD FORGET STUFF??

Amongst the many common experiences we have as parents and teachers, one of the more perplexing is those that end in the phrase (or thought) 'but you knew this yesterday!!' Whilst this can be really frustrating, Research into memory tells us that when we 'learn' something for the first time, it is natural for us to forget it and to then need to relearn it again (and sometimes several times) before it goes into what is known as 'long term memory' and is truly learned (rather than just temporarily remembered).


As counter intuitive as it sounds, forgetting is actually a necessary part of the learning process and every time we forget something, the work that goes into trying to recall it, while sometimes deflating, is actively helping the process of truly learning it. A useful visual for this was developed by German psychologist, Herman Ebbinghaus whose work on memory theory included the development of the 'forgetting curve' (see below). This tracked the average time it took someone to forget a piece of information but also the fact that each subsequent time it is 'relearned', it sticks that little bit more.

In school, the children regularly engage in something commonly known in education as 'retrieval practice' which is a form of test on knowledge they have been taught in previous lessons, terms and even years. This provides really useful assessment information for Class Teachers but also will be

helping the pupils' memory of the knowledge purely by being tested on it.

What does this mean for us as parents? Two things...

- 1. We should try not to get too frustrated when our children forget what we think they've learned forgetting it is natural!
- 2. We can really help our children properly learn things by checking ourselves whether they remember things like spellings, times tables facts, phonics sounds, etc, etc some time after we know they have initially learned them.
